Mayor Rusty Tinnin called the meeting to order. Pastor Tim Stutler offered prayer and Mayor Tinnin led the chambers in the pledge of allegiance.

ORDINANCE 23-1073

AN ORDINANCE TO SUSPEND THE APPLICABILITY OF ORDINANCE 19-960 FOR A PERIOD OF TWELVE MONTHS FROM THE POINT IN TIME IN WHICH THIS ORDINANCE BECOMES EFFECTIVE, AS IT RELATES TO PAYMENTS IN LIEU OF SIDEWALK CONSTRUCTION.

WHEREAS, by the passage of Ordinance 19-960 the City of Goodlettsville policies in which a developer could pay a sidewalk fee in lieu of constructing sidewalks, and

WHEREAS, recent court decisions have called into question the legality of such payment in lieu policies; and

WHEREAS, it will be advantageous for the City of Goodlettsville to suspend the applicability of 19-960 until which time a better-defined policy is determined.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF GOODLETTSVILLE, TENNESSEE, THAT

SECTION I. The applicability of Ordinance 19-960 be suspended for a period of twelve (12) months.

SECTION II. The aforementioned twelve (12) month suspension of applicability may be shortened or extended by passage of a Resolution of the City of Goodlettsville Board of Commissioners.

SECTION III. This Ordinance shall become effective fifteen (15) days past the final passage of the ordinance, the welfare of the Citizens of Goodlettsville, Tennessee require it.

THIS ORDINANCE IS EFFECTIVE FIFTEEN DAYS PAST FINAL PASSAGE, THE WELFARE OF THE CITIZENS OF GOODLETTSVILLE, TENNESSEE REQUIRING IT.

ORDINANCE NO. 19-960

AMENDMENT

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CITY OF GOODLETTSVILLE, TENNESSEE, MUNICIPAL CODE TITLE 16 BY CREATING A NEW SECTION 115 ENTITLED SIDEWALK PAYMENT OF FEE IN LIEU OF CONSTRUCTION.

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Goodlettsville, Tennessee has determined that it is in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of its citizens to amend its Municipal Code to allow for the payment of a fee in lieu of sidewalk construction as currently required.at the discretion of the City Manager or designee and to allow an appeal of such decision to the City of Goodlettsville Board of Commissioners;

WHEREAS, the City Manager or their designee, at their discretion and in accordance to the City's Design Guidelines, Zoning Ordinance, and Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan permit the payment of the "In Lieu of Sidewalk Construction Fee"; and

WHEREAS, all decisions of the City Manager or their designee may be appealed to the City of Goodlettsville Board of Commissioners.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF GOODLETTSVILLE, TENNESSEE:

Section 1. The facts and matters set out in the preamble to this ordinance are hereby found to be true and correct.

Section 2. The City of Goodlettsville, Tennessee Municipal Code Title 16 is hereby amended by creating a new Section 115 Entitled:

16-115 **Sidewalks Payment of Fee in Lieu.** The developer and / or contractor shall be responsible for the installation of sidewalks in all residential and commercial projects.

Sidewalks Payment of Fee in Lieu. The developer and / or contractor shall be responsible for the installation of sidewalks in all residential and commercial projects as required by the City's Design Guidelines, Zoning Ordinance, and Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan

- a) At the discretion of the City Manager or their designee, a property owner, contractor, or developer of a residential and commercial project may be permitted to pay a fee in lieu of the construction of sidewalks initially in the amount of \$152.00 per linear foot.
- b) The payment in lieu of fee shall be adjusted annually on July 1st in accordance to the most recent Consumer Price Index.
- c) Any person wishing to appeal the determination of the City Manager or their designee may do so by submitting an appeal to the City Recorder within ten (10) days of the City Manager or their designee's determination. Such will be heard at the next available City of Goodlettsville Board of Commissioners meeting.
- d) Sidewalks shall be constructed in accordance with the City of Goodlettsville Street Standards and Specifications and the adopted City of Goodlettsville Bicycle and

Pedestrian Plan. Sidewalks, when applicable, shall be considered as part of the required street system, whether public or private.

- e) This section shall not apply to residential and commercial projects including the construction of public or private streets that require sidewalks to be installed per city requirements and construction plans.
- f) When it is determined that an inadequate amount of Right-of-way exists for sidewalk construction on the subject property, the City Manager or his designee may require dedication of Right-of-way for future sidewalk construction.

Section 3. It is the intent of the City that this Ordinance shall comply in all respects with the applicable provisions of the United States Constitution, the Tennessee Constitution, and the Charter of the City of Goodlettsville. In the event any clause, phrase, provision, sentence, or part of this Ordinance or the application of the same to any person or circumstance shall for any reason be adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect, impair, or invalidate this Ordinance as a whole or any part or provision hereof other than the part declared to be invalid or unconstitutional; and the Board of Commissioners of the City of Goodlettsville, Tennessee, declares that it would have passed each and every part of the same notwithstanding the omission of any such part thus declared to be invalid or unconstitutional, whether there be one or more parts.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect fifteen (15) days from and after its final passage, the public welfare requiring it.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GOODLETTSVILLE, TENNESSEE AMENDING THE FISCAL YEAR 2023-2024 BUDGET, PASSED BY ORDINANCE # 23-1064

WHEREAS, the City of Goodlettsville adopted the fiscal year 2023-2024 budget by passage of Ordinance #23-1064 on May 11, 2023; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Tennessee state constitution, Section 24 of Article II, no public money shall be expended except pursuant to appropriations made by law; and

WHEREAS, the City has received a Violent Crime Intervention Fund grant thru the State of Tennessee Office of Criminal Justice; and

WHEREAS, the City has received additional grant funding through the Tourism ARP; and

WHEREAS, the City has received a Tennessee Department of Tourist Development Marketing Grant; and

WHEREAS, the City has a need to make certain improvements to stormwater infrastructure on Marshall Greene that were not included in the FY2024 Budget; and

WHEREAS, the FY2024 Budget did not include the purchase of a Public Works vehicle that had been budgeted in the Prior Year's Budget, but due to supply chain issues, the City was unable to purchase in the prior year;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF GOODLETTSVILLE, TENNESSEE THAT CHANGES BE MADE TO THE FISCAL YEAR 2023-2024 BUDGET AS FOLLOWS:

INTERLOCAL MUTUAL AID
AGREEMENT
FOR FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICES

This Agreement entered as of the _____ day of _____, 2023, by and among

The City of Goodlettsville, Tennessee, and

The Shackle Island Volunteer Fire Department, Incorporated

Pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated Section 6-54-601, relative to firefighting assistance, and in consideration of the covenants contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

1. The parties will respond to calls for firefighting and rescue assistance (provided by the respective fire department) upon request for such assistance made by the appropriate fire official of the fire department of the respective city, except as otherwise provided in section 5. All requests for assistance shall be made to the appropriate 9-11 dispatch center by radio or telephone.
2. Upon request for aid received as provided for in paragraph (1), the senior fire officer of the responding party will authorize response as follows:
 - a. The maximum response of and fire department will be no more than fifty percent (50%) of the total personnel and resources of the department. Each party's response will be determined by the severity of the emergency in the requesting party's jurisdiction as determined by the senior fire officer of the requesting party.
 - b. When there also is an emergency in the jurisdiction of the responding party at the time a request is made, or one occurs in the course of responding to a request under this agreement, and the senior fire officer of the responding party reasonably determines, after a consideration of the severity of the

emergency in his jurisdiction, that the responding party cannot comply with the minimal requirements of this agreement without endangering life or incurring significant property damage in his jurisdiction, or both, he may choose to use all equipment and personnel in his jurisdiction. In this case, the senior fire officer of the responding party shall either: (a) authorize or request the dispatch of alternate resources, or (b) attempt to inform the senior fire officer of the requesting party of the decision that has been made, as soon as possible. In cases where two or more requests for mutual aid assistance have been made at the same time, thereby making compliance with the minimum requirements of this agreement impossible for the responding party, the senior fire officer for the responding party shall determine, based upon a reasonable appraisal of the emergencies of the requesting jurisdictions, how best to respond to the requests. The senior fire official may determine to send all available resources under this agreement to the jurisdiction with the most dire emergency, or he may send some resources to each requesting jurisdiction. The senior fire officer shall inform of the requesting parties of his decision. In both situations outlined in this subsection (b) where compliance with the minimal requirement is impossible, the requesting party or parties will, not expect full compliance with those minimal duties, but will expect a fair appraisal of the emergencies involved and a commensurate response.

- c. When fire department personnel are sent to another community pursuant to this agreement, the jurisdiction, authority, rights, privileges, and immunities, including coverage under the Worker's Compensation Laws, which they have in the sending department, shall be extended to and include any geographic area necessary as a result of the request to which these personnel are acting within the scope of the authority conferred by this agreement.
3. No compensation will be paid by the parties under this agreement for mutual aid assistance rendered.
4. The senior fire officer in whose community the emergency exists, and who places the request for assistance, shall in all instances be in command of the emergency as to strategy, tactics, and overall direction of operations. All orders or direction regarding

the operations of the responding party shall be relayed to the senior fire officer in command of the responding party. A modified unified command structure shall be established when both fire departments are operating at the scene of an emergency. Each respective fire department shall maintain accountability and control of their respective personnel using their own separate accountability and control systems, but fully coordinated at the command post using the unified command structure.

- a. Exhibit A and the verbal description of exhibit "A" contained herein depicts the City Limit Boundaries of the City of Goodlettsville and the fire service district of Shackle Island Volunteer Fire Department, Incorporated. Additions or subtractions of said boundaries do not require new approvals of this agreement unless extenuating circumstances are present.
 - b. Employees / Volunteers of the Shackle Island Volunteer Fire Department, Incorporated who are responding outside of their fire service district shall be considered Shackle Island Volunteer Fire Department employees. Employees of the Goodlettsville Fire Department who are responding outside of the City of Goodlettsville shall be considered Goodlettsville Government employees.
5. As a component of this agreement, mutual and shared training for the purpose of ensuring seamless and professional shared responses between Shackle Island Volunteer Fire Department and Goodlettsville are required. When space is available and the proposal is reasonable, joint training shall be made available between both parties to this agreement. A minimum of 16 hours are required annually consisting of joint response planning, table top, classroom, and full scale exercises for fire and rescue services.
 - a. Employees of the City of Goodlettsville who are attending training in the Shackle Island Volunteer Fire Department Fire District shall always be considered employees of the City of Goodlettsville.
 - b. Employees and Volunteers of the Shackle Island Volunteer Fire Department who are attending training in the City of Goodlettsville shall always be considered employees of the Shackle Island Volunteer Fire Department.
6. This agreement shall continue from year to year, unless written notice of termination is given by either party hereto at least ninety (90) days prior to July 1 of any year. No

further obligations or liabilities shall be imposed upon the withdrawing party after termination. This agreement shall continue in effect with respect to all parties that have not withdrawn. Unless the number of active parties is reduced so that only one party remains.

This agreement shall be valid only when it is executed by the Mayor and Fire Chief of the City of Goodlettsville and Fire Chief and Board Member of the Shackle Island Volunteer Fire Department pursuant to appropriate action of the respective bodies execute it and be countersigned by the authorized officials of the other parties.

WHEREAS, RS2014-1180 approved individual agreements and individual amendments on August 5, 2014, between The Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County ("Metro") and the City of Belle Meade, the City of Brentwood, the City of Goodlettsville, the City of Lavergne, and the City of Millersville, for sewage treatment, with each individual term expiring on October 1, 2024; and,

WHEREAS, RS2015-1469 approved individual agreements on May 6, 2015, between The Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County ("Metro") and the City of Ridgetop and the White House Utility District, for sewage treatment, ending on October 1, 2024; and,

WHEREAS, the individual agreements and amendments allowed for the Selection of a Rate Consultant not later than October 1, 2018 to develop the initial Utility Price for the calendar year beginning October 1, 2019, and Metro and Wholesale Customers wish to extend the time allowed for the Selection of a Rate Consultant to not later than December 1, 2023, to develop the initial Utility Price for the calendar year beginning October 1, 2024; and,

WHEREAS, the Agreement is needed for Metro and Wholesale Customers to develop new long-term agreements for Metro to safely and effectively accept and treat sewage flows from the Wholesale Customers; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto do hereby agree as follows:

1. That Metro and Wholesale Customers shall select a Rate Consultant not later than December 1, 2023 to develop the initial Utility Price for the calendar year beginning October 1, 2024.
2. That the parties will develop new long-term agreements.
3. Affirmation. Except as expressly modified or amended herein, all of the terms, provisions and conditions of the individual agreements and individual amendments shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION III. The Street Classification plan would be adopted by resolution of the Board of Commissioners.

SECTION IV. This Resolution is effective upon adoption, the welfare of the citizens of Goodlettsville requiring it.
